Coat of Arms

Designed by the Congregation's Foundress, Blessed Mary of Jesus the Good Shepherd, the coat of arms of the Sisters of the Holy



Family of Nazareth is rich in meaning. The cross, with the superimposed monogram of Christ (P) between the Greek Alpha and Omega, represents Jesus, the beginning and end of all things. A lily and scepter intersect the cross diagonally, with the lily representing the Blessed Virgin Mary and the scepter, St. Joseph, a descendant of the house of King David. The cross, lily and scepter represent the Holy Family Encircled by gold rays, the dove hovering above the

cross, symbolizes the Holy Spirit, the Author of the Incarnation of the Son of God- the Love that is to fill the sisters' hearts and animate their community so that the sisters may radiate the Love onto their surroundings.

The papal tiara and keys reflect the sisters' union with and loyalty to the Church and the Holy Father.

Appearing below these symbols are the words of the Congregation's motto: Fiat Voluntas Tua (Thy Will Be Done), a concise expression of Nazareth Holiness and the fundamental plan of life drawn from the Foundress' contemplation of the life of the Holy Family that each sister accepts as her own.

The scarlet robe with the ermine lining and the crown represents the Kingdom of God's Love.
